Message from BUILDERS OF JEWISH EDUCATION (BJE)

Jewish education is central to the vitality of Jewish life, and teachers play a key role in shaping the learning experiences of their students. BJE is deeply appreciative of the leadership of the Milken Family Foundation, through its Jewish Educator Awards, in recognizing both the importance of Jewish education and of those who teach successive generations of students at our community's 34 BJE-accredited Jewish day schools. This year's award recipients, Rabbi Yossi Elefant, Rebecca Moray, Rabbi Ari Schwarzberg, and Einav Telem, reflect the excellence that characterizes Jewish education today.

In the cycle of weekly Torah study, this week's Torah portion includes Jacob's change of name to Israel. The new name emerges from, and connotes, struggle. Jacob/Israel and his descendants sometimes struggle, yet they persevere with renewed strength. Resilience is part of Jewish history, memory, and lived experience; it is among the lessons of Jewish education.

The Book of Genesis, of which Jacob's struggle is part, is largely about the Jews' long-standing relationship with the land of Israel. Patriarchs and matriarchs traverse the land, dig wells, build altars, assign place names, acquire property, and bury their dead in Israel. The Israel connection extends through the closing chapters of Genesis, even when Jacob/Israel and his family reside, temporarily, in Egypt; it is an abiding lesson of Jewish education.

Abraham, in the Book of Genesis, is told that he will be a blessing. God further says that Abraham will instruct his children and posterity to do what is just and right. Beyond the knowledge and skills they teach their students, outstanding Jewish educators, in the footsteps of Abraham, model and impart enduring values, enabling students to recognize and do tzedakah u-misphpat, what is just and right.

Jonathan Sacks reminds us that "we are guardians of the past for the sake of the future." Educators share with learners age-old wisdom to enrich the present and help imagine and create a better future. BJE proudly joins the Milken Family Foundation in honoring Rabbi Yossi Elefant, Rebecca Moray, Rabbi Ari Schwarzberg, Einav Telem and the field they so ably represent. These teachers are truly builders of Jewish education.

JEWISH EDUCATOR AWARDS

The Jewish Educator Awards was created by Lowell Milken and established as a partnership between the Milken Family Foundation and Builders of Jewish Education (BJE) in 1990. Each fall, four unsuspecting educators in BJE-affiliated schools are surprised before their entire school communities with individual, unrestricted Jewish Educator Awards of \$15,000.

Honorees reflect the highest ideals of Jewish and secular education, fostering the lifelong pursuit of knowledge and nurturing a value system that help guide students through adulthood. Recipients also demonstrate an outstanding ability to develop Jewish students' understanding of the connections among their religion, classroom activities and lives outside of school.



GOALS

Outstanding educators who continue to learn are essential to fostering student growth, improving schools and enhancing the education profession. Hence, the goals of the Jewish Educator Awards are:

- ★ To honor and reward outstanding Jewish day school educators for the quality of their teaching, their professional leadership, their engagement with families and the community, and their potential for even greater contributions to the healthy development of children
- ★ To increase public support and recognition for Jewish day school educators who make outstanding contributions to the development of their students
- ★ To increase public awareness of the important role of Jewish day school educators in the community and in society
- ▼ To encourage able, caring and creative people to choose the challenge, service and adventure of education as a career

SELECTION

Award recipients are selected by a committee of educators—both professional and lay leaders from the Jewish community—who have a long-standing concern for and involvement with education in Jewish schools.

To be eligible for consideration, educators must work a minimum of 15 hours per week at the K-12 level. They must have been working for a minimum of five years in a BJE-accredited school (need not be at the same BJE-accredited school for all the years).

Criteria considered for the selection of Jewish Educator Award recipients include:

- Exceptional educational talent and promise, as demonstrated by outstanding practices in the classroom, school and community
- **★** Evidence of originality, dedication and the capacity for leadership and self-direction
- Commitment to influencing policies that affect children, their families and schools
- Strong, long-range potential for even greater contributions to children, the profession and society
- Distinguished achievement in developing innovative educational curricula, programs and/or teaching methods

- An outstanding ability to instill character and self-confidence in students
- An outstanding ability to develop Jewish children's understanding of the connections among their religion, their classroom activities and their activities beyond the classroom
- Commitment to professional development and excellence, and the continuing Judaic and/or secular study necessary
- Personal involvement in responding to the needs of Jewish and secular communities

Criteria for administrators also include an outstanding ability to attract, support and motivate committed education professionals.

RABBI YOSSI ELEFANT Yeshiva Ketana of Los Angeles



For 12 years, Rabbi Yossi Elefant has worked morning, day, and night to provide a well-rounded education for young Jewish scholars. At Yeshiva Ketana of Los Angeles, he works as

the second grade rebbe and Judaic studies teacher in the mornings and serves as the middle school science teacher in the afternoons. Rabbi Elefant continues his work with college-aged students in the evenings, providing deeper instruction about their Jewish heritage.

Outside of the classroom, Rabbi Elefant is eager to assist his colleagues as the technology contact at Yeshiva Ketana. He takes the time to coach fellow teachers, sharing his classroom management strategies and pedagogical methods. Rabbi Elefant leads exciting and relevant hands-on science projects for students such as learning about photosynthesis,

respiration, and fermentation via chocolate-making, and building and testing popsicle stick boats and bridges—sometimes strong enough to hold his own weight! Rabbi Elefant holds a bachelor's in Judaic studies from Ohr Somayach Tanenbaum College, as well as a teacher's certification from the Ministry of Education of Israel and a rabbinic ordination from Rabbi Zalman Nechemia Goldberg in Jerusalem. He also completed the Ohr Lagolah Hertz Institute for International Teacher Training's Leadership Training Program in Jerusalem.

Rabbi Elefant strives not only to make learning exciting for students, but also to encourage their character development through his Middos program and spark a love for their Jewish heritage: "The single lesson I hope to instill in my students is a deep love for the Jewish way of life, rooted in Torah," he says. "I want them to see and feel that Hashem loves each of them unconditionally and is always present for us, regardless of who we are or what we have achieved."



REBECCA MORAY

Brawerman Elementary School of Wilshire Boulevard Temple West Campus



At Brawerman Elementary School of Wilshire Boulevard Temple West, lead kindergarten teacher Rebecca (Bec) Moray brings learning to life. Since beginning her career in education

in 2001, Miss Moray's passion for early childhood education led to exciting roles as a pre-K teacher and curriculum coordinator, ECE training mentor, floor time behaviorist, and more. Now bringing her experiences to kindergarten, Miss Moray leads students through engaging, multidisciplinary lessons that reflect her love of science, focus on the whole child, and incorporation of Jewish values.

In a lesson tied to Rosh Hashanah, students learn more about bees by role-playing the honey-making process. Students simulate other scientific phenomena using colored vests and props in class to represent cold air displacement, flower pollination, lava

formation, and even physics concepts like balanced and unbalanced forces. The Chanukah story is reflected in class through an oil and water lava lamp activity, while Tashlich and Yom Kippur are taught through experimenting with bread's reaction when dipped in various substances. Jewish concepts like ethical resource use, rebirth and renewal are taught through the KinderGARDEN, which students tend to year-round. Miss Moray is known for her interactive math games like lawn dart addition, balloon battle and fly swat numbers, as well as her puppet shows acting out stories from the Torah. Additionally, she is a teacher leader for STEAM nights and is a member of the instructional leadership team. Miss Moray holds a bachelor's in education from National University.

Empowering students to explore and care about the world around them is something Miss Moray emphasizes every day: "The vehicles and roads may vary widely, but viewing ourselves, each other, and the world with curiosity is the best fuel."



RABBI ARI SCHWARZBERG

Shalhevet High School



Students at Shalhevet High School have the space to build their character, resilience and ambition, thanks in large part to 12th grade dean and Judaic studies teacher Rabbi

Ari Schwarzberg. Since becoming a teacher at Shalhevet 13 years ago, his honesty and kindness help him build a strong rapport with students, colleagues and parents alike.

Hailing from a family of educators, Rabbi Schwarzberg keeps students' academic, emotional, and spiritual growth top of mind. He seamlessly instills Judaic values, Torah learning, and critical thinking into every class, whether teaching the highest level of Gemara (Talmud) shiur to juniors and seniors, advanced Tanach shiur to sophomores, or Jewish law to freshmen. Rabbi Schwarzberg's first year heading Shalhevet's participation in Yeshiva University's Gemara Learning Bekiut Program yielded outstanding results: His students took

four of the top six highest scores nationwide. Rabbi Schwarzberg holds a rabbinic ordination and a master's in education from Yeshiva University in New York, as well as a master's in theological studies from Harvard Divinity School in Massachusetts.

Rabbi Schwarzberg supports the betterment of those around him, inspiring the senior class to act as leaders and run town halls through Shalhevet's Just Community. Fostering a lifelong love of learning, he established the "Night Seder" initiative at Shalhevet, providing students with time after school once a week to learn on their own terms – not attached to their class grade or content.

"Every student, no matter their natural intellectual ability, work ethic, or familial expectations, can push themselves beyond their imagination," Rabbi Schwarzberg says. "Students need to leave their class feeling nourished, enriched, and proud of what they're learning and how they're growing."



EINAV TELEM

Valley Beth Shalom Day School



After discovering her passion for working with people while growing up in Israel, Einav Telem made her way to Valley Beth Shalom (VBS) Day School in 2006, where she now serves as a fourth

grade Hebrew and Judaic studies teacher. At VBS she wears many hats: She also teaches fifth grade Hebrew classes; supervises the Israeli Shinshin program (cultural exchange); directs the Generation's Day program and develops projects for grandparents and students to complete together; and leads the sixth grade Grinberg Passport to Israel trip.

VBS students and parents begin each morning with an enthusiastic welcome from Mrs. Telem in the parking lot as she ushers in students to begin an exciting day of learning. A former second grade teacher, Mrs. Telem's rich experiences in the classroom guide her written fourth grade Torah portion curriculum and tiered instructional strategies.

She enriches students' experiences and inspires them to be active participants in their education through organizing Jewish holiday celebrations, teaching the Book of Exodus via a character poster-making project using found objects, and strengthening students' connection to their heritage through her Israel Museum Project. Striving for schoolwide excellence, Mrs. Telem mentors teachers, pursues professional development opportunities, and connects the Hebrew faculty via group chat to share best practices and curriculum notes. Mrs. Telem holds a bachelor's in education from Oranim Teachers College in Israel.

"Learning is not just about absorbing information, but also about engaging with it actively, exploring beyond the surface, and always striving to know more," Mrs. Telem says. "This approach will help students succeed academically and empower them to navigate in the world with confidence and critical thinking."




Milken Archive of Jewish Music: The American Experience

In the process, it has created a unique resource that has special significance for Jews that resonates with people of all faiths and cultures.

Milken Community School

As an independent Jewish community school serving over 700 students in grades 6-12, learning at Milken Community School happens everywhere and with intention—it happens in classrooms, on trips, at programs, at home, online and offline, and during activities. It is grounded in Jewish ideas, values, traditions and practices. Learning encompasses social, emotional, intellectual and spiritual realms. Learning at Milken is personal and communal. It is both the realization of who we are and whose we are.
