
Message from the MILKEN FAMILY FOUNDATION

Message from BJE: BUILDERS OF JEWISH EDUCATION

Jewish educators nurture the collective *Neshama*, the Jewish spirit, of the Jewish people. BJE is deeply appreciative of the leadership of the Milken Family Foundation, through its Jewish Educator Awards, in recognizing both the value of high-quality Jewish education and the indispensable contributions of those who teach successive generations of students at our community's 35 BJE-accredited Jewish day schools. This year's award recipients, Nili Isenberg, Jared Stein, Rabbi Reuven Youkhehpaz and Hadassah Weiner, reflect the excellence that characterizes Jewish education today.

As we anticipate the lights, miracles, and lessons of Chanukkah in the coming days, an insight taught by Lord Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, of blessed memory, comes to mind, published on this day, December 11, 2004. He explained that 150 years after the Maccabees won their historic and miraculous victory against the Seleucid-Greeks to restore Jerusalem, the Roman Empire rose to power and destroyed the Beit Hamikdash, the Holy Temple in Jerusalem. Struggling to recover from the tragic losses, they debated if they could even celebrate Chanukkah. The Jewish community set upon ensuring our civilization could endure under foreign rule and dispersion—through the strengthening of yeshivot, of Jewish education. There was a lesson in healing and rebuilding, reflected in the Menorah:

"The Menorah symbolised something quite different from military victory. It represented faith, hope, loyalty, courage. Jews began to understand that the real clash between Ancient Israel and Ancient Greece was not political but cultural. To defend a country, you need an army. But to defend a civilisation, you need schools."

We honor four teachers today, gifting them back the honor they devote to our children every day. Collectively, they teach various elements of Jewish civilization, immersing our children in the bounty of music, prayer, middot/Jewish habits of behavior, ancient structures of Jewish logic and argument, Jewish customs and laws. They equip them to live in a complicated present, with the skills to create a sustainable future.

"The message of Chanukkah is simple," Sacks taught us. "What lasts is not victory on the battlefield, but the candle of hope we light in the mind of a child."

BJE proudly joins the Milken Family Foundation in celebrating Nili Isenberg, Jared Stein, Rabbi Reuven Youkhehpaz and Hadassah Weiner, shining examples among the many dedicated, talented teachers of Los Angeles who steward the souls of the next generation and create the world of goodness we all aspire to see. These teachers are truly builders of Jewish education.

JEWISH EDUCATOR AWARDS

The Jewish Educator Awards was created by Lowell Milken and established as a partnership between the Milken Family Foundation and Builders of Jewish Education (BJE) in 1990. Each fall, four unsuspecting educators in BJE-affiliated schools are surprised before their entire school communities with individual, unrestricted Jewish Educator Awards of \$18,000.

Honorees reflect the highest ideals of Jewish and secular education, fostering the lifelong pursuit of knowledge and nurturing a value system that helps guide students through adulthood. Recipients also demonstrate an outstanding ability to develop Jewish students' understanding of the connections among their religion, classroom activities and lives outside of school.

GOALS

Outstanding educators who continue to learn are essential to fostering student growth, improving schools and enhancing the education profession. Hence, the goals of the Jewish Educator Awards are:

- ★ To honor and reward outstanding Jewish day school educators for the quality of their teaching, their professional leadership, their engagement with families and the community, and their potential for even greater contributions to the healthy development of children
- ★ To increase public support and recognition for Jewish day school educators who make outstanding contributions to the development of their students
- ★ To increase public awareness of the important role of Jewish day school educators in the community and in society
- ★ To encourage able, caring and creative people to choose the challenge, service and adventure of education as a career

SELECTION

Award recipients are selected by a committee of educators—both professional and lay leaders from the Jewish community—who have a long-standing concern for and involvement with education in Jewish schools.

To be eligible for consideration, educators must work a minimum of 15 hours per week at the K-12 level. They must have been working for a minimum of five years in a BJE-accredited school (need not be at the same BJE-accredited school for all the years).

Criteria considered for the selection of Jewish Educator Award recipients include:

- ★ Exceptional educational talent and promise, as demonstrated by outstanding practices in the classroom, school and community
- ★ Evidence of originality, dedication and the capacity for leadership and self-direction
- ★ Commitment to influencing policies that affect children, their families and schools
- ★ Strong, long-range potential for even greater contributions to children, the profession and society
- ★ Distinguished achievement in developing innovative educational curricula, programs and/or teaching methods
- ★ An outstanding ability to instill character and self-confidence in students
- ★ An outstanding ability to develop Jewish children's understanding of the connections among their religion, their classroom activities and their activities beyond the classroom
- ★ Commitment to professional development and excellence, and the continuing Judaic and/or secular study necessary
- ★ Personal involvement in responding to the needs of Jewish and secular communities

Criteria for administrators also include an outstanding ability to attract, support and motivate committed education professionals.

NILI ISENBERG

Pressman Academy



Judaic studies teacher Mrs. Nili Isenberg brings her deep knowledge of history, culture and heritage to Pressman Academy scholars every day. Also serving as the kindergarten through eighth grade Judaic studies curriculum coordinator, she leads department meetings; contributes to building T'fillah, Parasha, Torah, and holiday curriculum; helps lead programs like FestiNaKH, Moot Beit Din, and Zman Kodesh; observes classes; and mentors new teachers.

In addition to teaching seventh grade Rabbinics and eighth grade TaNaKH, Mrs. Isenberg's seventh grade Mishna class learns about Jewish law (halachot) relating to major life cycle events like sitting shiva, the laws of marriage, and the rules of a bris. She brings in guest speakers of diverse backgrounds, personal experiences and traditions to show students the many facets

of Jewish observance. Mrs. Isenberg's unit on the Shoah immerses eighth graders in field trips, Holocaust survivor stories, and a Yom HaShoah Tekes (ceremony) they produce for third through fifth graders. She also leads students in planting daffodils to honor children lost during the Holocaust through The Daffodil Project. Mrs. Isenberg holds a bachelor's in religion and art history from Boston University, a master's in art history from Johns Hopkins University, and a Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) from American Jewish University.

Before becoming a classroom teacher at Pressman, Mrs. Isenberg spent years educating others about the Holocaust at the Museum of Jewish Heritage in New York, and spent her formative childhood years living in Israel. Now, these experiences shape what she seeks to instill in her students: "I hope that students understand that Judaism brings meaning to life in so many ways, and that being a part of the Jewish community is a precious gift to appreciate and embrace."



JARED STEIN

de Toledo High School



de Toledo High School is blessed with a welcoming Jewish music program shaped by Mr. Jared Stein, who celebrates his 18th year as director of instrumental music. Working tirelessly to grow the program over the course of his career, Mr. Stein has sparked joy for music in scores of students.

At de Toledo, he inspires others to embrace performance opportunities through ensembles he created, such as the Sephardic and Mizrahi Ensemble, and Shirei Yedidot—open to students and faculty. He has conducted the school's musical pit band, composed liturgy for the Havdalah ceremony, and wrote the school's alma mater. Mr. Stein infuses spirit and energy into preparing the next generation of Jewish leaders, whether by taking Jazz Band students on a biennial trip to New Orleans, teaching creativity and craft in a music production class, or helping the Music

Appreciation Club plan a schoolwide rock concert at a Shabbaton ("Jagfest").

Mr. Stein composes and performs Jewish music, has recorded an album with his wife Jamie, leads the Nashuva Band, and works as a cantorial soloist and song leader throughout Los Angeles. He served as music director at Camp Alonim for eight years before becoming involved at the Brandeis Camp Institute at American Jewish University, where he teaches Jews from around the world. Mr. Stein holds a bachelor's in music with an emphasis in ethnomusicology from UC Santa Barbara.

"It is a fundamental part of my teaching philosophy that by treating music as a language, we give our students a great gift to use in their life and career," Mr. Stein says. "The best way to put this gift in their hands is to allow students to 'jam' with masters of the language."



HADASSAH WEINER

Yeshiva Rav Isacsohn Toras Emes Academy



Mrs. Hadassah Weiner serves as the elementary girls principal at Yeshiva Rav Isacsohn Toras Emes Academy, where she has contributed her talent, experience, and innovation for

nearly a decade. She leads her department with pride, taking the time to channel her energy and simcha (joy) into the academic, social and spiritual growth of each student. She collaborates with families and staff to ensure each student receives individualized support, while ensuring the school's overall educational mission promotes a love for Torah and Yiddishkeit. Teaching staff members also know her boundless support, receiving reliable guidance, mentorship and professional development.

With a mission to create a positive, inclusive school culture, Mrs. Weiner created what is now a nationally growing character development program called "RAISE the Bar,"

which includes guided lessons, actionable steps, and curricular materials that can be embedded in the school day. RAISE stands for: Respect And Include Students Everywhere. She shares her experiences as a Torah Umesorah (National Society for Hebrew Day Schools) presenter and has delivered in-service workshops around the country. Additionally, Mrs. Weiner participates in many chesed (kindness) projects in her North Hollywood community. She obtained her teaching certification in Jerusalem from Machon Bnos Yehuda Seminary.

Between being the daughter of a rabbi and the wife to a rabbi, it's easy to understand Mrs. Weiner's inspiration to join the education profession: "From a young age, my parents instilled in me a deep sense of dedication to the klal and a love for chinuch that truly runs in my blood. They taught me that there is no greater privilege than teaching Torah to the next generation and inspiring others to strengthen their connection to Hashem."



RABBI REUVEN YOUKHEHPAZ

Yeshiva Aharon Yaakov/Ohr Eliyahu



Rabbi Reuven Youkhehpaz, fifth grade boys rebbe at Yeshiva Aharon Yaakov/Ohr Eliyahu for the past 16 years, possesses an energy and a positivity that know no limits. So much so, that he

recently assumed additional roles beyond the classroom: supervising second grade, third grade, and the schoolwide Keriah program for both boys and girls. Rabbi Youkhehpaz infuses hands-on projects into his Gemara, Chumash, Mishnah, and Halacha lessons, works with parents to support students' academic and personal growth, and meets with administrators to advance pedagogy and his own journey as a lifelong learner.

Rabbi Youkhehpaz's students engage in group discussions about Jewish texts, participate in a Sukkah project, and host a class play utilizing Gemara vocabulary. Originally inspired to teach because of his grandmother's work in education and commitment to teaching him

to read Hebrew, Rabbi Youkhehpaz now enjoys teaching his own students the same valuable skill using his cumulative Gemara vocabulary program and multilevel, schoolwide oral testing system. Beyond the classroom, he is a role model to students and colleagues alike. Highly visible in weekly staff meetings, Rabbi Youkhehpaz offers insights into effective instructional practices that improve the craft of others and enrich the educational environment of the school at large. Rabbi Youkhehpaz holds a bachelor's in Talmudic law from the Rabbinical Seminary of America Yeshiva Chofetz Chaim.

Rabbi Youkhehpaz's compassion serves as a guiding force for students, colleagues and the community: "I hope my students will live by the principle of 'Ve'ahavta L'Reacha Kamocha'—loving their fellow as themselves—and carry these values into every aspect of their lives, becoming individuals who inspire others through their character, actions, and commitment to Torah."

Lowell Milken founded the Milken Archive of Jewish Music in 1990 to discover, preserve, and disseminate the vast body of music reflecting the American Jewish experience over more than 350 years. Through new recordings by world-class artists and ensembles, an ambitious oral history project, and comprehensive written materials elucidating the music's historical and cultural context, the Archive now encompasses 600+ recorded works, including 500+ world premieres, supported by 800+ interviews and extensive liner notes. The Archive has charted a groundbreaking approach to cultural preservation, and in the process, has created a unique resource with special significance for Jewish communities and resonance with people of all faiths and cultures.

"In sharing the Milken Archive's diverse repertoire, scholarship, and multimedia resources, we seek to broaden public awareness of the various forms of Jewish musical expression that have contributed significantly to American Jewish cultural identity and to the music world in general. Founded by Lowell Milken to make teacher quality the cornerstone of school improvement, NIET was established in 2005 and builds educator excellence so all students can succeed. Building on the TAP System for Teacher and Student Advancement (launched in 1999), NIET partners with schools, districts, states, and universities to attract, develop, support, and retain effective teachers and leaders. NIET's approach integrates four proven levers: multiple career paths (teacher leadership roles), ongoing, job-embedded professional learning, clear instructional standards and coaching, and performance-aligned compensation—together strengthening classroom practice and schoolwide capacity. NIET has impacted more than 350,000 educators and 3.5 million students nationwide, and NIET's Aspiring Teacher Standards Rubric is used by 100+ universities to prepare a pipeline for the next generation of effective educators.

Lowell Milken Center for Unsung Heroes

Founded by Lowell Milken in 2007, LMC empowers students and educators to discover, research, and share the stories of Unsung Heroes—ordinary people whose courageous actions changed lives and history. Through project-based learning, students analyze primary sources, conduct interviews, and produce documentaries, exhibits, and performances that rescue the stories of these individuals from history. Programs include the Discovery Award research competition and ARTEFFECT visual-arts competition. At LMC's headquarters in Fort Scott, Kansas, the Lowell Milken Hall of Unsung Heroes showcases projects and resources, and Educator Fellowships provide training and materials. To date, LMC initiatives have reached 3,000,000+ students—advancing the motto: Discover · Create · Change.

After being liberated Harry was brought to America through the efforts of one of the U.S. Army advisors who had fought alongside him. As an immigrant, he has shown unwavering loyalty to his adopted country, advising the U.S. military on how to conduct relationships with foreign allies and collaborate against terrorist activities. For his courageous actions as a leader in the Vietnam War, Harry is the only foreign soldier to have received the Silver Star Medal, the highest award for heroism on the battlefield that the American military can grant an allied soldier.

Kansas, came across an article about Harry. Students Holly Reid and Andrea Sodahm contacted Henry and, through extensive research and oral history interviews, produced a documentary to tell his story.
